Colorado <u>Executive Order 2020-044</u> <u>FAOs</u> <u>Guidance</u>	4/26/2020	<ul> <li>Permits certain businesses that implement social distancing and cleaning protocols to reopen to the public, including, among others:         <ul> <li>Retail businesses and personal care services may reopen on May 1, 2020.</li> <li>All non-essential commercial businesses may reopen at 50% reduced in-person staffing capacity on May 4, 2020.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
Connecticut <u>Executive Order No. 7H</u>	3/20/2020	<ul> <li>Requires Connecticut non-essential businesses to require employees to work from home.</li> <li>Allows essential services to remain open, including grocery stores, gas stations and convenience stores, and take-out and delivery restaurants.</li> <li>Designates essential services based on DHS <u>Memorandum on Identification of Essential Critical Infrastructure Workers.</u></li> </ul>
Delaware	4/1/2020	• Modification 5 requires Delaware residents to stay at home.

Illinois <u>Executive Order 20-08</u> <u>Executive Order 20-18</u>	4/1/2020	<ul> <li>Requires Illinois residents stay at home through April 30.</li> <li>Allows essential services to remain open, including gas stations, stores that sell groceries and medicine (including convenience stores) and facilities that prepare and serve food for off-premise consumption.</li> </ul>
Indiana <u>Executive Order 20-26</u>	5/1/2020	• Permits certain nonessential businesses to reopen beginning on May 4, 2020 if they abide by general safety guidelines and limit their occupancy.
Iowa <u>Proclamation 1</u> <u>Proclamation 2</u> <u>Proclamation 3</u>	4/27/2020	<ul> <li>Permits certain restaurants, fitness centers, malls, libraries, and other retail establishments to reopen to the public in a limited capacity (e.g. limiting the number of customers to 50% of normal operating capacity) and requires such businesses to implement social distancing, hygiene, and public health measures.</li> <li>Extends the closure of certain businesses (e.g., bars, theaters, casinos, etc.) until May 15, 2020.</li> </ul>
Kansas <u>Executive Order 20-29</u>	4/30/2020	<ul> <li>Permits certain nonessential businesses to reopen May 4, 2020 if they abide by safety guidelines.</li> <li>Clarifies that the statewide stay at home order is no longer in effect.</li> </ul>

Louisiana <u>Proclamation No. JBE</u> <u>2020-52</u>	4/27/2020	<ul> <li>Requires Louisiana residents to stay at home through May 15.</li> <li>Allows essential services to remain open, including gas stations, stores that sell groceries and medicine (including convenience stores) and facilities that prepare and serve food for off-premise consumption.</li> <li>Permits restaurants to open their outside areas for people to eat meals (without tableside service).</li> </ul>
Maine <u>Emergency Order 49 FY</u> <u>19/20</u>	4/29/2020	<ul> <li>Requires Maine residents to stay at home through May 31.</li> <li>Allows essential businesses to remain open, including businesses that sell grocery and household goods (such as convenience stores) and gas stations.</li> <li>Allows individuals to visit businesses for nonessential activities.</li> </ul>
Maryland <u>Executive Order</u> <u>Guidance</u>	3/30/2020	<ul> <li>Requires Maryland residents to stay at home.</li> <li>Allows essential services to remain open, including convenience stores and retail fuel centers such as gas stations and truck stops.</li> </ul>
Massachusetts <u>Executive Order No. 13</u> <u>Essential Business List</u> <u>Press Release</u>	4/28/2020	<ul> <li>Requires Massachusetts residents to stay at home through May 18.</li> <li>Allows essential services to remain open, including convenience stores and retail fuel centers such as gas stations and truck stops.</li> </ul>
Michigan <u>Executive Order 2020-59</u>	4/24/2020	<ul> <li>Requires Michigan residents to stay at home unless performing an essential activity through May 15.</li> <li>Allows essential services to remain open, including gas stations, stores that sell groceries and medicine (including convenience stores) and facilities that prepare and serve food for off-premise consumption.</li> </ul>
Minnesota <u>Executive Order 20-20</u> <u>FAOs</u> <u>Executive Order 20-48</u>	4/30/2020	<ul> <li>Requires Minnesota residents stay at home through May 18.</li> <li>Allows essential services to remain open, including gas stations, grocery stores, convenience stores, and take-out and delivery restaurants.</li> <li>Permits certain non-essential workers to return to work on May 4, 2020 if they are not able to perform certain work activities from home and if they abide by safety protocols.</li> </ul>
Mississippi <u>Executive Order No. 1477</u>	4/24/2020	• Permits certain businesses and non-profit entities to reopen to the public in accordance with certain health safety measures on April 27.

		• Clarifies that other businesses (e.g., restaurants, bars, gyms, personal care services, etc.) are limited to drive-thru, curbside, and/or delivery service.
Missouri <u>Public Health Order</u>	4/27/2020	<ul> <li>Permits non-essential businesses to reopen to the public if they abide by social distancing requirements.</li> <li>Imposes specific occupancy thresholds on retail establishments and other limitations on restaurants.</li> </ul>
Montana <u>Directive</u>	4/22/2020	• Permits non-essential businesses to reopen to the public in phases between April 26 and May 4 if they comply with certain safety guidelines.
Nebraska <u>Guidance</u>	4/29/2020	• Permits restaurants and certain other non-essential businesses located in specific counties to reopen if they abide by health guidelines and occupancy restrictions.
Nevada <u>Directive 016</u> <u>Essential Business</u> <u>Guidance</u>	4/29/2020	<ul> <li>Requires Nevada residents to stay at home through May 15.</li> <li>Allows essential businesses to remain open, including convenience stores, gas stations, and restaurants on a take-out, curbside pickup, delivery, or drive-through basis only.</li> <li>Permits non-essential retail businesses to provide delivery and curbside pickup.</li> </ul>
New Hampshire <u>Emergency Order 40</u> <u>Retail Store Guidance</u> <u>Restaurant Guidance</u>	5/1/2020	<ul> <li>Permits retail stores and other non-essential businesses to reopen on May 11 if they abide by safety guidelines.</li> <li>Permits restaurants to reopen on May 18 if they abide by safety guidelines.</li> </ul>
New Jersey <u>Executive Order 107</u>	3/21/2020	<ul> <li>Requires New Jersey residents stay at home.</li> <li>Allows essential services to remain open, including grocery stores, retail functions of gas stations, convenience stores, and restaurants as long as they only offer food delivery and/or take-out services.</li> </ul>
New Mexico <u>Public Health Emergency</u> <u>Order</u>	3/23/2020	• Allows essential services to remain open, including gas stations, stores that sell groceries (including convenience stores) and facilities that prepare and serve food for off-premise consumption.
New York <u>Executive Order 202.6</u> <u>Executive Order 202.8</u>	3/20/2020	<ul> <li>Executive Order 202.8 closes non-essential New York businesses.</li> <li>Executive Order 202.6 allows essential services to remain open, including healthcare, utilities, transportation infrastructure, manufacturing, grocery stores, pharmacies, news media, construction, and vendors of essential services.</li> </ul>

North Carolina <u>Executive Order No. 121</u> <u>Executive Order No. 135</u>	4/23/2020	<ul> <li>Requires North Carolina residents to stay at home through May 8.</li> <li>Allows essential services to stay open, including gas stations and businesses needed for transportation, convenience stores, and restaurants that prepare and serve food for consumption off-premises.</li> </ul>
North Dakota <u>Executive Order 2020-06.4</u>	4/29/2020	• Permits restaurants, bars, and certain other non-essential businesses to reopen on May 1 if they abide by certain safety protocols.
Ohio <u>Director's Order</u>	4/30/2020	• Permits retail establishments to reopen on May 12 if they limit their occupancy and implement safety measures.
Oregon <u>Executive Order No. 20-12</u>	3/23/2020	• Requires the closure of certain businesses, but does not apply to truckstops.
Pennsylvania <u>Executive Order</u> <u>Updated Industry</u> <u>Guidance</u> <u>Press Release</u>	4/1/2020	<ul> <li>Permits certain nonessential businesses in 24 counties to reopen on May 8.</li> <li>Allow life sustaining businesses to remain open in all counties, including truck stops.</li> </ul>
Rhode Island <u>Executive Order 20-13</u> <u>Executive Order 20-14</u> <u>Executive Order 20-23</u>	4/10/2020	<ul> <li>Requires Rhode Island residents to stay at home through May 8.</li> <li>Critical retail businesses may remain open, including gas stations, convenience stores, and restaurants for pickup, drive-through, and delivery.</li> </ul>
South Carolina <u>Executive Order 2020-28</u>	4/20/2020	• Permits various "non-essential" retail stores (e.g., furniture, clothing, and jewelry stores, etc.) to reopen to the public on April 20; and requires such stores, if open, to implement certain safety measures (e.g., limiting occupancy, increasing sanitation, and following social distancing protocols).
Tennessee <u>Executive Order 29</u> <u>Retail Guidelines</u> <u>Restaurant Guidelines</u>	4/24/2020	• Permits restaurants and retail stores in certain counties to reopen to the public while complying with certain safety guidelines.
Texas <u>Executive Order GA-18</u>	4/27/2020	• Permits all retail stores, restaurants, movie theaters, and certain other non-essential businesses to reopen to the public on May 1 and requires such businesses to limit their capacity to 25% of their listed occupancy, among other things.

Virginia <u>Executive Order No. 53</u> <u>(2020)</u> <u>Executive Order No. 55</u> <u>FAQ</u>	3/30/2020	<ul> <li>Requires Virginia residents stay at home.</li> <li>Allows essential services to remain open, including gas stations and convenience stores and restaurants that prepare and serve food for consumption off-premises.</li> </ul>
Washington <u>Executive Order 20-25</u> <u>Proclamation</u>	5/4/2020	<ul> <li>Requires Washington residents to stay at home through May 31.</li> <li>Allows essential services to stay open, including gas stations and businesses needed for transportation, convenience stores, and restaurants that prepare and serve food for consumption off-premises.</li> <li>Permits certain nonessential businesses to reopen.</li> </ul>
West Virginia <u>Executive Order 9-20</u> <u>Guidance</u>	3/23/2020	<ul> <li>Requires West Virginia residents to stay at home.</li> <li>Allows essential services to remain open, including gas stations and businesses needed for transportation, convenience stores, and restaurants that prepare and serve food for consumption off-premises.</li> <li>Allows certain small businesses and restaurants to reopen.</li> </ul>
Wisconsin <u>Emergency Order No. 12</u> <u>Emergency Order No. 28</u>	4/16/2020	<ul> <li>Requires Wisconsin residents to stay at home through May 26.</li> <li>Allows essential services to stay open, including gas stations and businesses needed for transportation, convenience stores, and restaurants that prepare and serve food for consumption off-premises.</li> </ul>
